Cautious Babus Stall Govt IT Projects

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The fear of being hauled up by anticorruption sleuths has brought government decision making on investments in the information technology sector to a crawl, holding up some key projects that could alter the lives of citizens for the better

In the face of discouraging global cues, many Indian IT companies were depending on demand from the Rs 1.10.000 crore domestic IT market to tide over the ongoing economic slowdown, but with government authorities choking on decisions, projects worth at least ₹10,000 crore have been held up.

"Everyone is cautious," said Navin ernance advisory at consultancy KPMG. "Senjor officials prefer to double check before they sign and anprove large projects." The list of projects delayed for at least six months includes the automation of employment exchanges, computerising the public distribution system and an ambitious plan to delivaccording to industry insiders. In fiscal 2011, the government had spent #20,400 crore according to industry yet to receive their payments.

"The short-term outlook on Indian government IT spending is cautious." said Manish Bahl director and senior analyst at market research firm For-
