Aakash, Cheapest Tablet, Launched

The world's cheapest tablet computer was launched in India on Wednesday with 500 school students becoming the first few recipients. Telecom and HRD minister Kapil Slbal launched the tablet—Aakash—priced at \$55 (€1,750) for students pursuing graduation and said that the government aimed to increase production to bring down the cost of the tablet to less than \$510 (5500).

The government is sourcing the tablet from UK-based Datawind at 2256—inclusive of all taxes, levies, freight and insurance charges, servicing and documentation. The first lot of 100,000 tablets will be provided to states at 71,750 per tablet. "Our utilimate aim is that in the coming vears this tablet should cost less than \$10. Datawind has said that if an order of one million units is placed the cost to of the tablet (to the government) would be 1,750 (\$35), on which the government will offer a 50% subsidy (while giving it for suchem)s, "Sibal said.

He added that the private sector was also interested in providing subsidy to help the government achieve the

sub-\$10 cost for the tablet.

Aakash is the first government initiative in the crowded table tranker in India, with more than adozen Indian and multinational tablet makers vying for a share of the three-lakh-unitsa-quern market. The world's cheapest tablet comes to India at a time when Apple's IPAD holds more than half the market, followed by Samsung's Gal-axy that has cornered roughly a quarter and the rest of the turf occupied by low-cost manufacturers.

The \$35-tablet is Wi-Fi enabled with a 7-inch touch screen and is based on Google's Android 2.2 operating system. It has an internal storage capacity of 2GB which can be increased to 32 GB with an SD card, a battery back

up of nearly three hours and two USB ports.

Datawind, which makes the tablet in Hyderabad at 700 units a day will begin selling the tablet commercially by end of November at £2.990 with a year-long warranty under the brand name of Ublislate, the company's chief exceutive officer Suneet Singh Tull said. Ublislate will come with an inbull £2 SIM for web access, with an internet planat ₹99 per month, from an Indian mobile operator which Datawind is finalising as of now.
